The Town has completed its first full year as a Regulated MS4. Since York was the new kid on the block, we needed to submit six specific plans and procedures to Maine DEP with deadlines throughout the year. This could not have been done without our consultant, Kristie Rabasca of Integrated Environmental Engineering. THANK YOU, KRISTIE!

MS4 Permit Requirements and Meetings for June:

We had our year-end York County MS4 meeting on June 4, 2014. Kristie handed out a spreadsheet with items she'll need for each town's annual report to MEDEP. The report is due September 15, 2014 and each town will have any outstanding items to Kristie by August 15th.

Kristie arranged a meeting with Department of Marine Resources, the York County Shellfish Commissioners, and the York County MS4 coordinators to discuss ways to collaborate efforts and exchange data. DMR and Kristie both did short presentations which gave the group a good base to start talking. All agreed the meeting was a great idea and plan on meeting again, date to be determined. DMR be in York sometime between June and November to walk the shoreline and make observations of potential pollution sources along a portion of the York River to potentially open addition recreational clam flats.

I did some follow-up inspections at the CNR-7 culvert where bubbles had appeared a couple of weeks in a row. No bubbles found in the follow-up inspections, and there was nothing conclusive from the surfactant and entro tests. Will continue to monitor this area.

Our Illicit Discharge Detection and Elimination (IDDE) Program was filed on June 30, 2014 with Maine DEP. The Program is a requirement under Minimum Control 3 IDDE of the MS4 2013-2018 General Permit, and basically describes how the Town will handle a detected illicit discharge or non-stormwater discharge. The proposed Non-Stormwater Discharge Ordinance would give the Town the authority to prohibit illicit discharges.

The Non-Stormwater (Illicit) Discharge Ordinance went before the Planning Board on June 26, 2014 for the second Public Hearing. The Board voted 4-0 to forward to the amendment to Board of Selectmen for their first Public Hearing on July 28, 2014.
